## NATIONAL ACTIVITIES

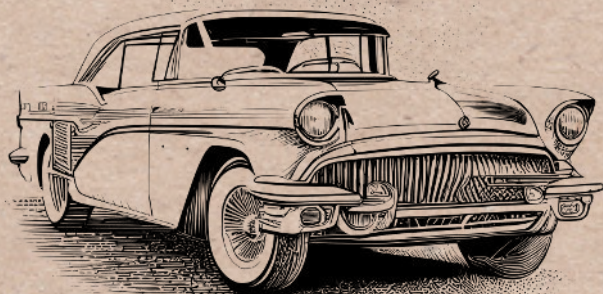

Coming up at the end of this month, July 23-25, is the AACA Central Division Spring Nationals in Green Bay, WI. As of today, there are 90 vehicles registered. Then, during the first part of next month, August 5-8, some 60 vehicles will be making their way to Flat Rock, NC for the Southeastern Divisional Tour. August 19-22 will be the Annual Grand Nationals and Zenith Awards in Allentown, PA, where we will be hosted by the NB Center. 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## INDIANA, PENNSYLVANIA

### HOME OF JIMMY STEWART!

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The AACA Eastern Division Spring Nationals were May 28th through May 30th in Indiana, PA – a town of some 14,000 people about an hour east of Pittsburgh and... the home of Jimmy Stewart. Jordan and I made the journey up there – and got into Indiana about 4:00 PM Thursday – just in time to get checked in and drive downtown to the Jimmy Stewart Museum, where we boarded a bus to see where Jimmy grew up! We went to see Jimmy's boyhood (until age 7) home – or rather where his boyhood home "used" to be... as it burned some years ago and is now a parking lot. But the original steps up to the Stewart front porch are still there – complete with plaque! The next stop was the Stewart's next home on "Vinegar Hill" – a pretty "posh" neighborhood of large two-story houses overlooking downtown Indiana. We could even see the Stewart's church from there – the Presbyterian church where Jimmy attended and his father, Alex, sang in the church choir. We went by the place where the Stewart Hardware store used to be – but sadly, it is gone also. All that is left is the stone sign that was part of the building reading: "Stewart Hardware." Our last stop was "Jimmy Stewart Airport" where Jimmy's own plane, A Cessna 310-H from 1961, is on a huge pedestal display in front of the facility. As you may know, Jimmy flew bombers during WWII and loved aviation. He remained in the Air Force Reserve after the war and rose to the rank of Brigadier General. He said that if acting hadn't worked out, he would have been a commercial pilot, as he loved aviation that much. Jimmy's 310-H at the airport is well documented as being the plane he and his wife Gloria plus their two daughters used to fly back home to "see the folks" when they were living in California. After Jimmy won the Academy Award in 1940 for *The Philadelphia Story*, his dad, Alex, called him in the wee hours the next morning and told Jimmy that he heard on the news he had won some big award.

Then he told Jimmy to box it up and send it to him – he wanted to put it in the hardware store window. Jimmy did as his dad wanted and his Oscar remained in the store window for the next two years! Back at the museum after the bus tour, we were treated to food and drink and toured the exhibits and... watched a brief documentary in the museum theater about the upcoming release of *Jimmy* – a movie about Jimmy's time flying in World War II and his return and adjustment back to civilian life as he made his first post-war film with Director Frank Capra – *It's a Wonderful Life*. The movie stars KJ Apa as Jimmy Stewart and is due for release November 6th. The taxi that appears in *It's a Wonderful Life* was on display in front of the museum courtesy of the NB Center (where it is housed) in Allentown, PA – the site of this year's Annual Grand Nationals in August. Nicola Bulgari – of international jewelry fame – is the founder of the NB Center. There were 273 vehicles on the show field at Indiana on Saturday, and it was one of those "chamber of commerce" type days with cooler weather and plenty of sunshine as we all enjoyed the day's activities!

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# NATIONALS AT OAK RIDGE

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Preparation for the Southeastern Fall Nationals began months before the Volunteer Region received its charter from the AACA. And the work continued until the last tablecloth was removed from the tables, following the closing night awards banquet.

The attitude among the members of the club was more than a "can-do" spirit. It was the "what can we do?" enthusiasm that prevailed throughout the 11 months of brainstorming, planning and hard work that led to the success of the region's first national event.

Along the way, new friends were made and old friendships were strengthened as the members of the Volunteer Region worked together as a team with a single goal in mind: to make the meet a success.

Nearly 150 cars from states as far away as Iowa and Texas converged on the "Secret City" of Oak Ridge, Tennessee to participate in a celebration of patriotism, our nation's 250th birthday, and beautiful automobiles.

The three-day event kicked off with a bus tour of sites that were significant to the Manhattan Project. The three-hour tour was narrated by Oak Ridge's official historian, D. Ray Smith. After returning back to the hotel at the end of the day, the consensus was that the tour was fantastic, but just not long enough. As P.T. Barnum said "always leave them wanting for more."

On day two of the event, members participated in the National Judging School, as well as a Members Roundtable where ideas were exchanged on ways to improve and enhance the old car hobby.

The evening's activity was an ice-cream social that featured music by the J-25 Jazz Quartet and a presentation by the Smoky Mountain Service Dogs organization. The social was scheduled to be held at the picturesque Melton Lake Park, but threatening weather forced the event to be relocated to the Double Tree Hotel.

The hotel accommodated the last-minute change in plans by opening up both the lobby and the pool area for guests to enjoy.

Weather cleared on the third day, just in time for the antique automobiles to be placed on display in Oak Ridge's AK Bissell Park. Cars began to file in at 7:00 AM, as members of the Volunteer Region guided the cars to their specific parking spots on the show field. Positioning the cars on the field was accomplished by Field Marshall R G Lewallen and a team of trained and organized volunteers.

National AACA president Vicky Bolton presented dash plaques to each driver and West Peterson, editor of the Antique Automobile, snapped pictures of each car as it proceeded along the park's gravel path.

While the cars were arriving, a force of more than 90 judges met over breakfast and divided themselves into teams of five each in order to give each car a fair and thorough evaluation. Their efforts were coordinated by Chief Judge Rick Lay. Several region members served as judges, including Rick Lay, Dawn Lay, Jordan Lay, Robbie Gray, Paul Darling, Tom Howard, and R G Lewallen.

Later that morning, AACA Executive Director, Steve Moskowitz provided the Owners' Orientation, which is geared toward first-time exhibitors. The Owners' Orientation is held at every national meet and is usually conducted by VP of National Awards Rick Lay. However, Rick was pre-occupied with his duties as Chief Judge during the event.

At 11:00 AM, judging began and was kicked off by the presentation of the nation's colors by the Oak Ridge High School Jr. NROTC corps, followed by the National Anthem, which was beautifully sung by Volunteer Region member Beth Harris.

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As the judges conducted their rounds and the day progressed, members of the Volunteer Region made sure the needs of our guests were served by providing complimentary water, shuttling people to and from the air-conditioned Conference Center, as well as offering AACA merchandise for sale on the show field. First Aid services were available on-site by Nurse Stephanie Lewallen.

Drivers were dismissed at 3:00 PM as the owners returned their cherished antique cars to their trailers or their parking spots at the hotel. There was just enough time for everyone to shower and clean up in preparation for the evening's Awards Banquet.

The dinner, held in the Oak Ridge Conference Center, was a Tennessee-style barbecue. The red, white, and blue table decorations and a scattering of Moon Pies throughout the room added to the patriotic vibe that permeated the event.

After a few brief welcoming remarks by Club President R G Lewallen, AACA President Vicki Bolton and Explore Oak Ridge President Katy Watt, the awards presentation began.

President Bolton presented the Volunteer Region with an award of appreciation for hosting the Nationals.

Meet Chairman Roger Frazee accepted the award on behalf of all members of the club.

At the end of the evening, dozens of awards were presented to vehicle owners, many of whom will use their newly-earned award status to advance to the next level of AACA certification.

As the books are closed on the 2026 Southeastern Fall Nationals, it is clear that the event could not have been accomplished without the hard work and enthusiasm of the members of the Volunteer Region. Nearly every member of the club served in multiple capacities before, during and after the event. All deserve a special thanks for their hours of planning and execution of the meet.

In addition to the club volunteers, a special thanks goes out to the people of Oak Ridge, including Doubletree by Hilton, Explore Oak Ridge, Oak Ridge High School, Oak Ridge Recreation and Parks, ORAU, Roane State Community College, and the Oak Ridge Police Department. The Volunteer Region is grateful for the assistance of everyone who contributed to the success of this national antique automobile event.

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## MY START IN THE OLD CAR HOBBY

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I really cannot remember a time when I was not interested in old cars. My earliest memories are of my father's 1956 Buick and then the 1959 Oldsmobile (pictured). My grandfather had a 1956 Studebaker President sedan, for which I also have fond memories. Nobody else in the family had an interest in antique vehicles – just me. I remember that after church on Sundays, I would bug my father into making the rounds of all the used car lots (especially the back rows) and/or a trip to White's Junk Yard. I was always thrilled to find cars of the 40's and early 50's on the back rows – and I was always fascinated with those Cadillac sedans of the early and mid-fifties, which I referred to as the "fat ones."

A trip to White's Junk Yard was the ultimate thrill, as there was quite the variety of vehicles – some going back to the 1930's. Maxwell White, the proprietor, used to say that "Ricky" knew his inventory better than he did. In the middle of a virtual "sea" of vehicles was Max's little one-room house with a wooden plank scale in front of it (for weighing the cars and other loads of metal). He also had a little shed down the path between vehicles that contained the metal cutter – I remember my father demonstrating its use one Sunday by cutting up a piece of stainless side trim into little 6-inch pieces. I now think back to how valuable those pristine trim items would be to fellow hobbyists today!

Being in real estate, my father would always be bringing something home that he had taken in on a land trade. There was a '49 Studebaker pickup, a 1954 Chevrolet Bel Air sedan, a 1959 Ford 9-passenger wagon, and a 1960 Desoto sedan (that was my favorite).

I, of course, remember visiting the Smoky Mountain Car Museum in Pigeon Forge in the early 60's and also Bellm's Cars and Music of Yesterday in Sarasota, FL. I still have the individual auto postcards I collected from both museums.

About the time I was 9 years old, Jim Adams (the local Buick and Oldsmobile dealer) took in, as a partial trade-in, a 1923 Buick Touring car. It was 1964, and one afternoon my father and I were at the dealership, and Jim said, "Ricky, you want to ride in the Buick?" It probably took me less than 5 seconds to be in the seat, and off I went with Jim down Madison Avenue and around the McMinn County Courthouse and back out to the dealership. What a ride! This was my first ride in a "really" old car. Jim kept the Buick in his showroom until his death and the closing of the business. I later co-owned the car with an AACA friend.

In 1969, the Glidden Tour passed through Athens, and their lunch stop was the campus of Tennessee Wesleyan College. I remember that day as clearly as if it were yesterday. Long-time ETR member Ray Campbell (who operated the Athens Dry Cleaners) had alerted me to the coming day, and I counted down the days until the tour came through. Knowing how I felt about old cars, my father came to Athens Jr. High and took me out of school so that I could be at the college when the cars began arriving. What a Dad! I was in heaven! Never before had I seen such cars – Pierce Arrow, Stutz, Cord – names I had only heard about – and some I had never heard of! This served to only fuel the fire further.



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## MY START IN THE OLD CAR HOBBY

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Until graduation from Tennessee Wesleyan College (now University) in 1978, all I could do was dream about and admire antique cars belonging to others. By 1982, I had enough money saved to buy a 1963 Lincoln Continental 4-door convertible that I saw at a Kruse Auction in Atlanta. I had ridden down with someone, and I drove the Lincoln back home (with working air conditioning). I had to keep the car in a mini-storage facility and finally agreed to sell the car after a couple of years to fellow AACA member Jerry Smith. After the Lincoln, I got into Corvettes with a 1964 and a 1968 model – a nice used model could still be bought in 1983 for \$ 5,000 to \$ 6,000! After the Corvette craze, I had the 1971 Lincoln Mark III craze with two examples of those. In 1984 I bought a 1949 23rd Series Packard that I was painting and re-chroming.

Later that year, I bought a 1955 Cadillac Series 75 division window limousine by Derham. It was also in July of 1984 that I attended my first-ever Kaiser-Frazer National Convention in Pigeon Forge, TN. After that, I was never the same and owned multiple KF products over the next 40-plus years. I still have the 1954 Kaiser Darrin sports car that I bought in 1993. Other cars include an AACA Repeat DPC 1971 Mustang Convertible that Dawne and I got in 1996 and took on several AACA tours. And there is also Jordan's 1929 Jordan convertible coupe and our 1998 Mercury Grand Marquis, which is an AACA Repeat Senior Original. Like everyone else, I wish I still had some of the cars I once owned and sold.

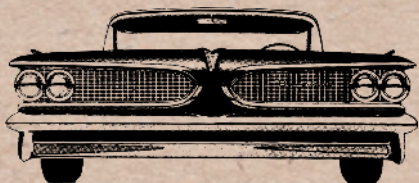

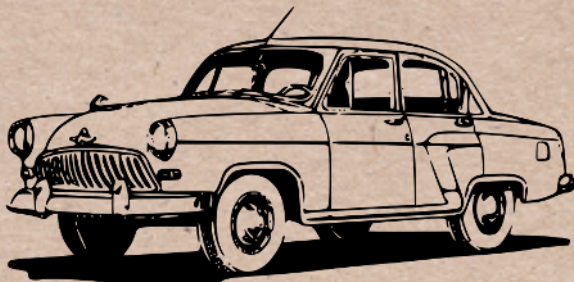
## SOUTHEASTERN REGIONAL FALL MEET UPDATE

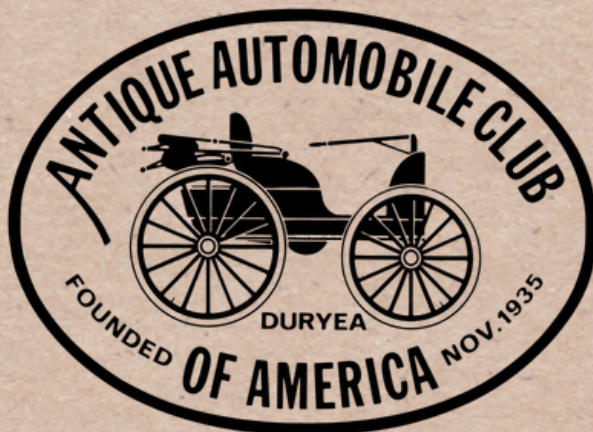
